United Way British Columbia Healthy Aging administers the Better at Home program throughout BC, supporting over 85 non-profit organizations who deliver Better at Home in over 260 communities.

This community-based approach ensures that local agencies are responding to local needs. Better at home is funded by the Government of B.C. and managed by United Way British Columbia Healthy Aging.

What is Better at Home?

United Way's Better at Home program helps BC's older adults continue living independently in their own homes by providing simple, non-medical home support services. Its unique 'seniors planning for seniors' approach means older adults contribute to the design, operation, and evaluation of their local program.

Who delivers the services?

In each community, local non-profit organizations deliver Better at Home services. Services are provided by volunteers, contractors and/or paid staff.

Am I eligible and how do I apply?

If you are a senior or elder living in a community that has a Better at Home program, you can apply by calling **604.268.1312**, or see the back page of this pamphlet for your local program contact details.

Who pays for Better at Home?

The Government of BC, through the Ministry of Health, provides funding to the United Way of the Lower Mainland to manage the Better at Home program across BC. Individual community organizations will also accept donations, raise funds, and encourage volunteer participation.

Seniors who receive Better at Home services will pay a fee based on their income. Some services may be free. The fees-for-service are fed back into the local program in order to serve more seniors.

Which communities does Better at Home currently serve?

Better at Home United Way manages 67 Better at Home programs across the province.
